Liturgical Reflection For several centuries, the traditional Forty Hour Devotion has been celebrated in parishes as a time of renewal and prayer. In the early 1500s at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Milan, Italy, Forty Hours Devotion began probably as a commemoration of the forty hours that Christ's body lay in the tomb between his death and resurrection. By the 1700s the form of devotion was codified for the churches of Rome. Forty Hours Devotion was first approved for the diocese of Baltimore in 1857 and extended to all the diocese of the United States in 1868. The Second Vatican Council encouraged the practice of solemn annual exposition in every parish. Order for the Solemn Exposition of the Holy Eucharist, 1993, Introduction, Number 1.
